College readiness more than a catch phrase at CHS

Even though most Commerce High School students have grown up with a four-year university in their own city, many of them have no exposure to the realities and expectations of college. Some express apprehension about applying for admission to any university even though Texas A&M University-Commerce is right across the street, so to speak.

Staff members at Texas A&M University-Commerce and Commerce ISD are working to change that perception by exposing high school students to college experiences such as expanded dual-credit offerings, campus visits and presentations explaining admissions procedures and applying for financial aid.

According to CISD Superintendent Blake Cooper a concerted effort has been made this year to strengthen the public school/university partnership and make enrolling in TAMU-C a viable option for an increased number of juniors and seniors.

During monthly meetings with Wendy Gruver, director, Student Assessment, College Readiness and Retention, and Dr. Ricky Dobbs, dean, University College, TAMU-C, and, CISD administrators including Adam Rupert, CHS principal, Rose Gardner, assistant CHS principal, and Julia Robinson, CISD director of curriculum, discussed multiple

options to ease apprehension for students and build working relationships with staff at both entities.

The first initiative addressed increasing dual-credit course offerings to juniors and seniors. While dual credit courses allow high school students to acquire college credit, they also allow them to earn credit at a significant cost savings. A dual credit course costs high school students about \$150 plus books.

Increased dual credit offerings for the next school year will allow a junior to acquire about 27 semester hours before graduating high school— 12 for juniors and 15 for seniors.

When Commerce High School students reported back to school after the holidays, Gruver had planned several activities to help them increase their collegiate understanding before their college semester started. Panels of current university students spoke to the high school dual credit students about how college life differed from their high school lives. Increased responsibility, time management, self discipline and finances were topics the university students felt were important for the high school students to understand.

In special presentations by Gruver and Dobbs, high school students were exposed to the language and

vocabulary of higher education so that GPA, SHC and other specific terms would be familiar. She explained that they would be assigned a success coach to help them during their freshman year.

Gruver also arranged TAMU-C tours for the high school students including dining in the cafeteria and visiting the library to make the campus seem more accessible.

As the focus continues in college and career readiness, Cooper says barriers must be removed such as class rank and weighted grades to encourage students to take classes needed for their future careers.
