
CHS celebrates Black History

Gamification of tough concepts engages Algebra students

To increase students' ownership of their learning, CMS math teacher Patricia Nelle developed a STAAR Wars themed unit to help them grasp difficult topics. She created a website with links to videos and activities for students to watch and complete. After taking notes from online sources, students complete an online practice and then a quiz. If they pass the quiz, they earn a badge to place on their journal. All students who complete 14 badges at the end of the two weeks will be treated to a movie and a snack after the STAAR test and be named STAAR Warriors.
