Board approves \$2500 retention stipend

During action on Thursday, May 12, the CISD Board of Trustees approved a \$2500 payment to each returning staff member to be paid on August 8. Superintendent Charlie Alderman said the purpose was to encourage current staff to remain in the district so that continuity of instruction and services could be maintained and enhanced. As staffing shortages continue across the state, Commerce ISD wants to maintain and reward staff for remaining in the district.

The Board also reduced the number of duty days for staff, which is in line with the reduction for teacher days made earlier this spring. Staff working on a 226-day calendar will be changed to a 220-day duty schedule. Others are as follows:

240 days to 235 • 216 to 210 • 206 to 200 • 192-196 to 190 • 187 to 180.

Tri County SSA employees will receive the same calendar reductions. In response to the change that TEA made in going from a specific number of days in a school year to a set number of minutes, CISD reduced the number of work days to offset instructional days getting longer.

Board approves taser use by district police officers

CISD Police Chief Justin Westbrook presented a taser use policy for board consideration. The policy allows officers, with specialized training, to have another less-than-lethal force option when dealing with non-compliant or aggressive subjects. The majority of area school districts have the option to use tasers, according to Westbrook. The Board majority approved the proposal with Dr. LaVelle Hendricks abstaining.

- Texas Sports & Civil Engineering was chosen as the architect/engineer for the baseball and softball turf installation at CHS.
- The virtual education program was approved for a hospitalized student.
- Superintendent Alderman reported that enrollment was up 11 students to 1493, the highest this school year.
