#### **CES interim principal home again**

One look at Jeanne Lay as she sits behind the principal's desk at Commerce Elementary School and one can tell she feels at home. Not only is Lay returning to a principal's desk, but she has also returned to her hometown.

Lay, now interim principal at CES, was reared in Commerce and

attended East Texas State University for her bachelor and master's degrees. She landed her first teaching job at Como-Pickton ISD where she remained for 22 years, teaching second grade for 15 years, gifted and talented and English as Second Language classes for four years and then becoming high school principal for three years. She came back to Commerce during the 2009-2010 school year to become the secondary curriculum facilitator.

"It was not a tough decision to return to Commerce 18 months ago because of my roots here and my love for education. My family (the Lytles and the Pirkeys) being here, plus the opportunity to work with Julia Robinson in the CISD curriculum department, sealed the deal," Lay said.

Lay also likes the idea of following in former CES principal Bobbie Thurman's footsteps. Thurman retired from the position she held for 19 years last December.

"So many great things are going on here. It is wonderful to have this opportunity. It was an easy choice," Lay added.

Lay says her goal is to ensure that each teacher has what they need to reach every student.

"I want to make sure students' needs are met—to see and nurture the whole child and make this school a positive experience which will set the foundation for what they can expect later in school," Lay continued.

"I couldn't hand pick a better staff to fulfill the goals we have set. From the custodians, food service workers, support staff and teachers, I have the absolute best available," Lay said.

She credits her assistant principal, Diane Stegall, for getting her off to a fast start. Having known Stegall for many years, Lay said the two were ready to get to work, building on the trust that began years ago when they played volleyball together in school.

Lay's family has been educating students in Commerce for many years. Her father, Jerry, was a principal in the district while Jeanne was a student. Deanna Hays, Jeanne's sister, currently is an assistant principal at Commerce High School.

Jeanne is married to Chuck Lay, also a Commerce native, and they have a daughter who is a college student. Chuck has been a veterinarian in Sulphur Springs for 30 years.
