## Foundation awards \$29,000 in grants

In a "Publisher's Clearinghouse-style" presentation, the Commerce Schools Educational Enrichment Foundation board members notified teachers in their classrooms that their grant proposals had been funded for this school year. Nine projects totaling over \$29,094 will provide a sound system for CHS, a writing camp for seventh graders and technology for CES. Trips to the Dallas World Aquarium, the Tyler Zoo, Heard Natural Science Museum and Austin were also included in the projects receiving funding. ACW will be able to study Georgia O'Keefe and her art.

Dr. Jack Pirkey, president of the Foundation, said the Foundation had funded over \$200,000 in projects since its inception.

The Foundation provides enrichment opportunities outside the normal school budget.
